Mr Tim Fulcher

Ophthalmologist, Mater Hospital and Beaumont Hospital, Dublin

Mr Tim Fulcher is a Consultant Ophthalmic Surgeon at the Mater Misericordiae University Hospital, Mater Private and Beaumont Hospital.

Mr Fulcher completed subspecialty fellowship training in cornea and external eye disease at Moorfields Eye Hospital, London and in eyelid, lacrimal and orbital disease in Brisbane under Prof Timothy Sullivan.

He is also an Honorary Consultant Ophthalmic Surgeon at Temple Street Children's Hospital in Dublin. He served as president of the Irish College of Ophthalmologists (2021-2023).



Ms Lisa McAnena

Ophthalmologist, Mater Hospital and Beaumont Hospital, Dublin

Ms Lisa McAnena is a Consultant Ophthalmic Surgeon at the Mater Misericordiae University Hospital, Mater Private and Beaumont Hospital.

Ms McAnena completed subspecialty fellowship training in paediatric ophthalmology and strabismus at the Royal Eye Hospital and Great Ormond Street Hospitals in 2018/19, London and in neuro-ophthalmology at Moorfields Eye Hospital London in 2020/21.

She delivers medical and surgical ophthalmology services in her clinical practice, including cataract surgery and sub specialises in neuro-ophthalmology and strabismus.



Ms Chríosa O'Connor

Clinical Optometrist, Mater Hospital, Dublin

Ms Chríosa O'Connor qualified as an optometrist from DIT, Kevin Street in 2000. She moved to the UK where she gained clinical experience working as an optometrist in a range of settings including refractive surgery, diabetic retinopathy screening and grading, independent and corporate practice, accredited cataract referrals schemes, and in the laser clinic, St James's Hospital in Leeds. She took on a role in professional services at Vision Express, overseeing their pre-registration optometrist support across the UK and Ireland.

Whilst in the UK she completed a post-graduate diploma in Clinical Optometry from City University, London.

Chríosa returned to Ireland in 2011 where she worked as an optometrist in private practice, followed by a clinical optometrist role in Prof William Power's iVision practice, Blackrock Clinic.

Since 2017, Chríosa has been a part time clinic supervisor in the student optometry clinics at TU Dublin.

She has been in her current post as a Clinical Optometrist at the Mater Misericordiae University Hospital since 2021.

Dr Margaret Morgan is a Consultant Medical Ophthalmologist based in Dublin with a clinical commitment in Community Healthcare Organisation 7 and the Royal Victoria Eye and Ear Hospital with an interest in developing eye services for adults in the community. She led a pilot service for diabetic retinopathy screening and was the first clinical lead for the development and roll-out of the National Diabetic Retinopathy Screening Service in Ireland. Dr Morgan is a member of the service development committee of the Irish College of Ophthalmologists.



Ms Tania Constable

Clinical Optometrist, CHO7; President, Optometry Ireland

Ms Tania Constable is an experienced clinical optometrist, working within the HSE for the last 6 years, both in an acute and secondary care setting within ophthalmology.

Tania gained her undergraduate degree from the University of Manchester in 2007, and then went on to work in the U.K for a number of years before returning to Ireland. She was one of the first optometrists to hold the College of Optometrists Higher Certificate in Paediatric Eye Care.

Tania has a special interest in the development of eye care resources for children with additional needs. She established one of the first additional needs eye clinics within the HSE (Irish Health Service).

Ms Aoife Doyle is a Consultant Ophthalmic Surgeon at the Royal Victoria Eye and Ear Hospital and St James's Hospital in Dublin. She was appointed the Clinical Lead for the National Clinical Programme for Ophthalmology in 2023.

Ms Doyle has a wealth of experience in delivering ophthalmology services

including the development of the integrated cataract and glaucoma service across the RVEEH and Community Healthcare Area with colleagues in Kilnamanagh Tymon Primary Care Centre (CHO7). The service is paperless with an electronic medical record and imaging platform shared with RVEEH to allow all clinical information to be accessible at the point of patient care.

Ms Doyle also set up a nurse-led glaucoma assessment clinic service where patients with mild to moderate stable glaucoma are monitored in the pathway. The aim is to improve capacity for the hospital eye services to see the more complex and surgical patients and reduce waiting times, improving outcomes in glaucoma care through the collaboration of the hospital and community eyecare services.



Ms Sarah Spain

Senior Orthoptist, Roscommon Primary Care Services Health and Social Care Professions Lead for the National Clinical Programme for Ophthalmology

Ms Sarah Spain is the Health and Social Care Professions Lead for the National Clinical Programme for Ophthalmology. She is currently working as a Senior Orthoptist in Roscommon.

Dr. Emer Doolan graduated from UCD in 2015. She completed her ophthalmology training in the Mater Hospital, Galway University Hospital, the Royal Victoria Eye and Ear Hospital and Children's Health Ireland.

Dr. Doolan achieved her Certificate of Completion of Specialist Training from the Irish College of Ophthalmologists in 2023, and is currently a consultant at the Royal Victoria Eye and Ear Hospital, CHO6 and CHO7. She has a special interest in medical retina.



Professor John Nolan

Founder and Director, Nutrition Research Centre Ireland; Howard Chair in Human Nutrition and Principal Investigator of the Macular Pigment Research Group, South East Technological University, Waterford

Professor John Nolan, a Fulbright Scholar, is a full professor at the South East Technological University (SETU), Waterford, Ireland, where he holds a Howard Chair in Human Nutrition and is the Director of the Nutrition Research Centre Ireland (NRCI). His research centre studies the role of nutrition for vision, cognitive function and prevention of age-related diseases.

In 2011, Prof Nolan won a prestigious European Research Council (ERC) research grant to study the impact of nutritional supplementation on visual function via two major clinical trials (CREST 281096; Central Retinal Enrichment Supplementation Trials). As part of this ground-breaking work, Prof Nolan identified how targeted nutrition can improve visual function for the general population, and for patients with age-related macular degeneration (AMD).

More recent studies at the NRCI have investigated the link between nutrition and brain health and function, and over the last number of years Nolan and team have published novel papers on how targeted nutrients enhance cognitive function for the general population and improve quality of life for patients suffering with Alzheimer's disease.

Prof Nolan has published 117 peer-reviewed scientific papers on his area of research (H index = 53). A major career highlight is his role as founder and Chair of the International Brain and Ocular Nutrition Conference (BON Conference), which was held at Downing College, Cambridge University (www.bonconference.org).
